Hence in this regard, AEMRN and our collaborators always strive to promote team work as together and through generation, sharing and utilization of knowledge and experiences, we can make huge differences in the lives of people in hard to reach communities in middle and low-income countries. It was with the idea that the experience Sharing conference was conceptualized to acknowledge and build upon our successes and also at the same time debate our challenges in the implementation of our various projects. The conference has been organized twice – 2012 und 2013 - at the WHO Head-quarters in Geneva and in 2016 at the United Nations Palais des Nations in Geneva.

Objectives of the conference

- Review the success and challenges of managing projects in low and middle-income countries especially Sub-Saharan Africa with special focus on the medical missions and mobile clinics with a wide range of collaborators.
- Present the analysis and outcomes of projects and initiatives from AEMRN and other partners for lessons learnt and seek collaboration for scaling-up of same.
- Identify synergies and common areas of interest with NGOs, departments within the United Nations and sub-agencies such as the WHO, IOM, UNDP, UNEP etc. to maximize outputs for the benefit of the people we serve in low-income countries.
- To support AEMRN and partners create a knowledge management strategy to improve access to information, resources and support knowledge networking and optimize sharing of project ideas and initiatives.

- Find and share existing knowledge and resources and create a common strategy that improves access to information and much needed resources in complementing efforts of achieving the UHC addresses any of the components:
 - National Health Policies
 - Service delivery and safety
 - Health workforce
 - Health financing for universal coverage
 - Essential medicines and health products
 - Health statistics and information systems

Methodology

The two days conference will be informal, but will be opened by key note address and presentations that will set the scene for a brain storming session.

There will be breakout sessions addressing challenges in mobilising resources for projects with special tips on grant writing. The outcome from the sessions will be collated during a plenary feedback session and key activities will be prioritized, and issues discussed.

The secretariat will prepare the final strategy and highlights of the conference, which will be shared with all participants.
